
Fairfax Definition

Diversion First offers alternatives to incarceration for people with mental illness or developmental disabilities who come into contact with the criminal justice system for low level offenses.

The goal is to intercede whenever possible to provide assessment, treatment or needed supports. People needing diversion may also have a substance use disorder, which often co-occurs with mental illness.

Diversion First is designed to prevent repeat encounters with the criminal justice system, improve public safety, promote a healthier community and is a more cost-effective and efficient use of public funding.

What happens at the MCRC?

- Diversion from arrest for people experiencing behavioral health crisis
- Patrol officers from six jurisdictions to exchange custody
- Puts deputies, police officers and behavioral health staff together at one site

What did we have to do?

- MOUs between jurisdictions, allowing for custody exchange after working through risk management concerns
- Cross-system policies and procedures
- Partnership evolution:
 Cooperation →
 Coordination →
 Collaboration

Diversion First Highlights: MCRC


• **Diverted from arrest**: **680** individuals were diverted from arrest from January 2016 through September 2017 (375 in 2016, 305 in 2017)





Diversion First Highlights: Merrifield Crisis Response Center (MCRC)


- Law enforcement involved cases:
 - The number of law enforcement involved cases increased by 25% from 2015 to 2016
 - A 14% increase is expected in 2017 from the previous year



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Diversion First Highlights: MCRC

- Emergency Custody Orders (ECOs):
 - The number of ECOs increased by **123%** from 2015 to 2016
 - A 25% increase is expected in 2017 from the previous year



DIVERSION FIRST Why Diversion First?

issues.

Roughly 1 in 3 jail inmates have behavioral health issues. Inmates with behavioral health issues stay 20 days longer in jail than inmates without behavioral health More than half of the population recidivate in 3 years.

Next Steps: Four Key Outcome Measures

Reduce

The number of people with behavioral health /SMI booked into jail

Intercept 1, 2, 3:

Merrifield Crisis Response Center (MCRC), Police, Jail, Court

Shorten

The average length of stay for people with behavioral health/SMI in jail

Intercept 2, 3: Jail, Court, CSB Jail-based services

Increase

The percentage of connection to care for people with behavioral health/SMI in jail

Intercept 1, 5: CSB (MCRC), Homeless shelters, etc.

Lower

Rates of recidivism

> Intercept 4: Jail, Court, Police

DIVERSION FIRST 2017 Focus on Courts

- Courts Stakeholders Group with Judge leadership
- Extensive pretrial service practice changes
- Strengthened collaboration across system especially in General District Court
- Virginia Supreme Court approved Drug Court application for Circuit Court
- Veterans Docket established and now CSB clinical staff are connected budgetarily
- Need to align Juvenile and Domestic Relations Court

2017 Focus on Super-Utilizers

- Individuals with complex behavioral, physical, and/or social needs who are frequent users of a broad range of services and may have a high number of contacts with emergency medical technicians and law enforcement.
- Despite the large amount of resources devoted to this population, they are often provided in fragmented ways that do not lead to stabilization or improved outcomes for individuals.
- Not satisfied to just study! Our future coresponder model being built around this.
